
Tier 3 Vocabulary

Code	A systematic collection of rules
Jealous	Feeling or showing an envious resentment of someone or their achievements, possessions, or perceived advantages.
Principles	A basic idea or belief
Humanism	A set of ethics or ideas about how people should live and act
Humanist	A person having a strong interest in or concern for human welfare, values, and dignity. Someone who follows Humanism
Christianity	People who believe Jesus is the son of God and follow his teachings
Christian	Someone who follows Christianity
Morals	Having to do with what is right and wrong
Dilemma	A problem
Justice	Upholding what is right and fair
Freedom	The power or right to act, speak, or think as one wants without hindrance or restraint
